

# Bill 68 and Proposed Changes to the Conservation Authorities Act and Ontario's Conservation Authorities

- Introduced on November 6, 2025 Plan to Protect Ontario Act (Budget Measures)
- Schedule 3 of Bill 68 changes CAA to create Ontario Provincial Conservation Agency. The Objects of the Agency are:
- 1. Oversee the governance of authorities and other aspects of authorities such as their operations, including the programs and services they provide.
- 2. Oversee the transition to a regional watershed-based framework for authorities in Ontario.
- 3. Promote consistent policies, standards, and fees for programs and services provided by authorities.
- 4. Assess and report on the effectiveness of authorities.
- 5. Oversee and evaluate the financial performance of authorities.

- Objects of the Agency are (continued):
- Guide and evaluate the strategic planning by authorities to ensure it aligns with provincial objectives.
- 7. Support the development and implementation of a standardized and centralized system for processing applications for permits issued by authorities.
- 8. Lead the development and implementation of digital strategies and shared services.
- 9. Support strategic investment in programs and services provided by authorities.
- 10. Advise the Government of Ontario in respect of the programs and services authorities provide.

- The Minister can issue directions to the Agency
- The Agency can issue directions to one or more authorities, which authorities must comply with, including but not limited to:
- 1. Key performance indicators (KPIs), key results and service delivery targets.
- Service standards.
- 3. Information Technology.
- 4. Procurement.
- 5. Training of members and employees.
- 6. Budgeting.
- 7. Asset Management Planning.
- 8. Strategic Planning (to align with Provincial Interests not local).

- Agency may determine its costs and apportion these to the conservation authorities.
- As of November 19, 2025 Bill 68 has had first reading and second reading and is being debated. Third reading and Royal Assent expected late November or early December.

# ERO Posting 025-1257 – Proposed Boundaries for regional consolidation of CAs


- November 7, 2025: MECP posted this on the ERO.
- Ontario's current 36 CAs would be consolidated into 7 regional CAs.
- Consultation period is open until December 22, 2025.
- Feedback requested on:
  - Key factors to support a successful transition
  - Opportunities or benefits from this structure
  - Suggestions for a governance model
  - Suggestions on maintaining a transparent, consultative budgeting process
  - How can regional model strengthen local relationships

# What is a Watershed? Why does it matter?

#### Water flows Downstream...

- A watershed is simply a catchment area
- When rain falls, it either infiltrates, evaporates, or runs off
- What happens on your property might affect your neighbours and vice-versa







# **Fundamental Principles of Conservation Authorities**

#### **Local Initiative:**

 Two or more municipalities sharing a watershed petition the Minister to establish a conservation authority.

#### **Cost Sharing:**

- The Conservation Authorities Act, 1946 stipulated that the costs of projects should be shared by municipalities and by the provincial government.
- This division of costs changed over time. Now GSCA covers half the cost and seeks funding for the remainder.

#### **Watershed Jurisdiction:**

- Conservation Authorities were to have jurisdiction over one or more watersheds.
- By its power to establish regulations, an authority has been able to protect life and property, river valleys from building encroachment and erosion problems.

# Ontario's Conservation Authorities


- 36 Conservation Authorities throughout Ontario
- Over 14-Million people live in a CA jurisdiction.
- Complete ~32,000 Planning and Permit Reviews Annually
- Manage over \$3.8-Billion worth of flood control and prevention infrastructure
- Protect lives and Prevent more than \$150-million per year in flood damages and disruption
- Work with landowners to plant over 1.3-M trees annually
- Offer 3,500 km worth of trail for people to enjoy, hosting almost 10-M visitors annually



#### **GSCA BACKGROUND**

- Started in 1957 and 1958 as the North Grey Region Conservation Authority and the Sauble Valley Conservation Authority, respectively.
- Two Authorities amalgamated in 1985.
- Eight Member Municipalities
- 11 Board Members (all elected officials) ensures a democratic process with a weighted budget vote.
- > 3100 Square Kilometers
- Five major rivers and over 155km of Shoreline
- Employs 28 Full and Part Time Staff (plus seasonal staff)
- \$4.2M Annual Budget
